

## DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 17.91 million with more than 686,000 deaths.

The total number of cases in the U.S. increased from 4,405,932 as reported on Thursday 7/30/2020 to 4,649,102 reported today. The number of deaths in the U.S. increased from 150,283 to 154,471.

The California Area Indian Health Service (IHS) has reported that 446 California Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients have tested positive for COVID-19 as of 8/1/2020.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is hosting a Clinician Outreach and Communication Activity (COCA) call tomorrow, August 4, 2020 from 2:00 PM-3:00 PM EDT. The topic is COVID-19 and telehealth implementation with stories from the field. Presenters will discuss telehealth benefits and challenges during and after the COVID-19 pandemic. On July 30, 2020, the National Indian Health Board (NIHB), the National Congress of American Indians, and the National Council of Urban Indians submitted a letter to House and Senate appropriators urging them to ensure a minimum 5% statutory set-aside in funding for COVID-19 vaccine distribution for the Indian Health Service (IHS). The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) has taken action to require better, more timely collection of data on race, ethnicity, gender identity, and sexual orientation to better understand the impact of COVID-19 on the state's diverse communities. The regulations require providers and labs to continue to collect and report race and ethnicity and patient's gender identity and sexual orientation data. ### COVID-19: U.S. at a Glance\*

- Total cases: 4,649,102
- Total deaths: 154,471
- Jurisdictions reporting cases: 55 (50 states, District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands)

\*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020. The position statement included a case definition and made COVID-19 a nationally notifiable disease.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

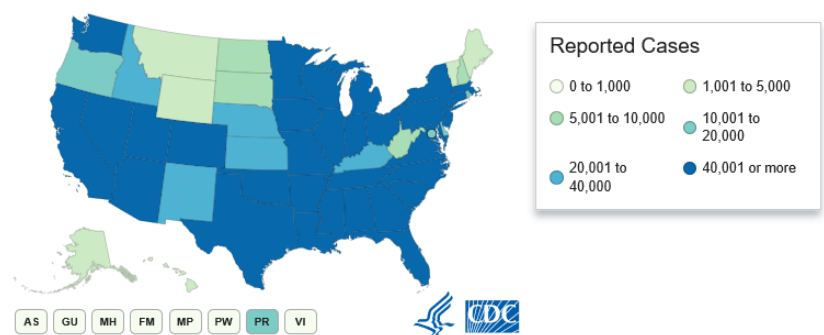
A probable case or death is defined by:

- meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or
- meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or
- meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19.

State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.

- Total tests reported: 52,942,145 (updated as of 7/27)
- Positive tests reported: 5,046,506
- Percent of positive tests: 10%

## CALIFORNIA

As of August 1, 2020, there were a total of 514,901 positive cases and 9,388 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

- Age 0-17: 47,286 cases
- Age 18-49: 311,547 cases
- Age 50-64: 98,574 cases
- Age 65 and older: 56,786 cases
- Unknown/Missing: 708 cases

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

- Female: 256,875 cases
- Male: 252,050 cases
- Unknown: 5,976 cases

Lab tests reported statewide: 8,184,696

Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

## INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE CALIFORNIA AREA

7,281 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 8/1/2020.

Of these, 446 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 5,934 have tested negative for COVID-19.

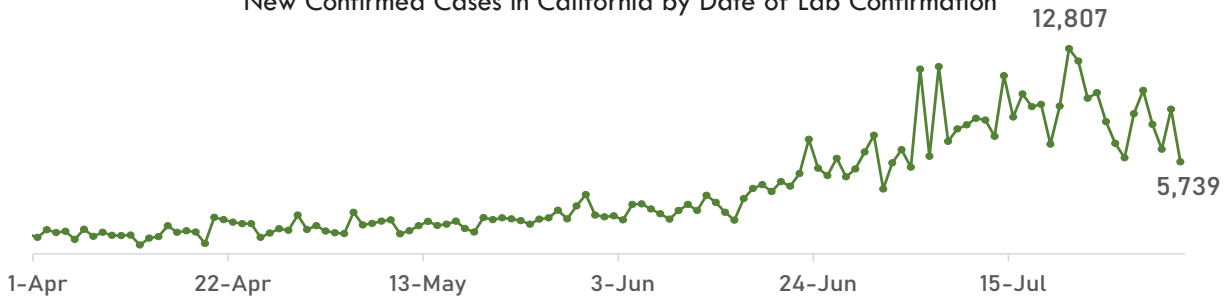

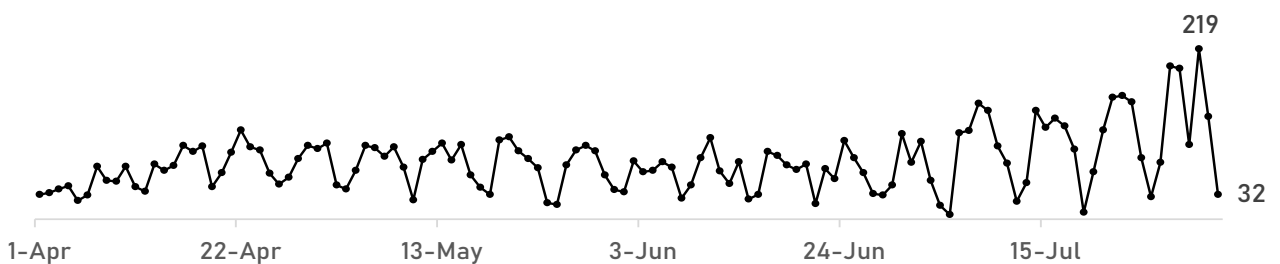

New Confirmed Cases in California by Date of Lab Confirmation

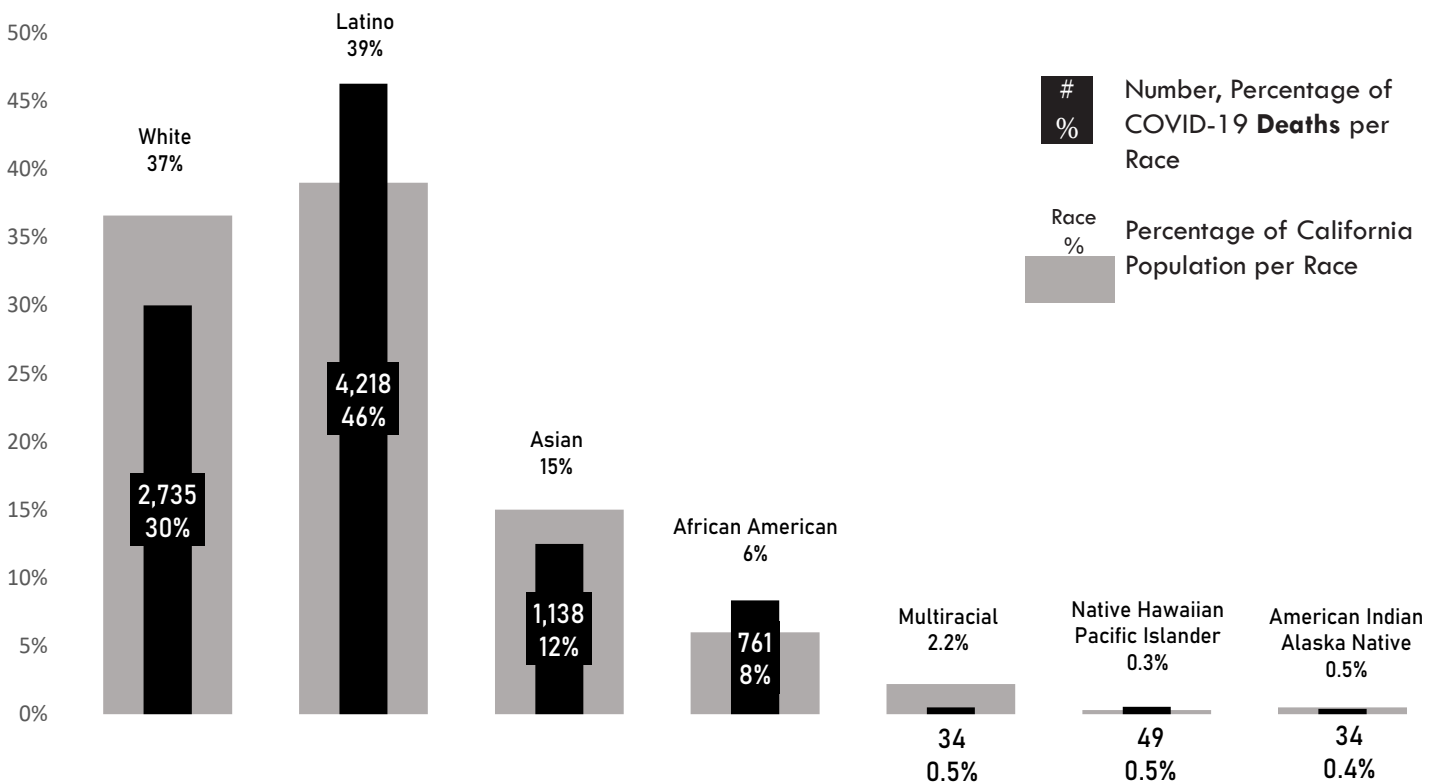
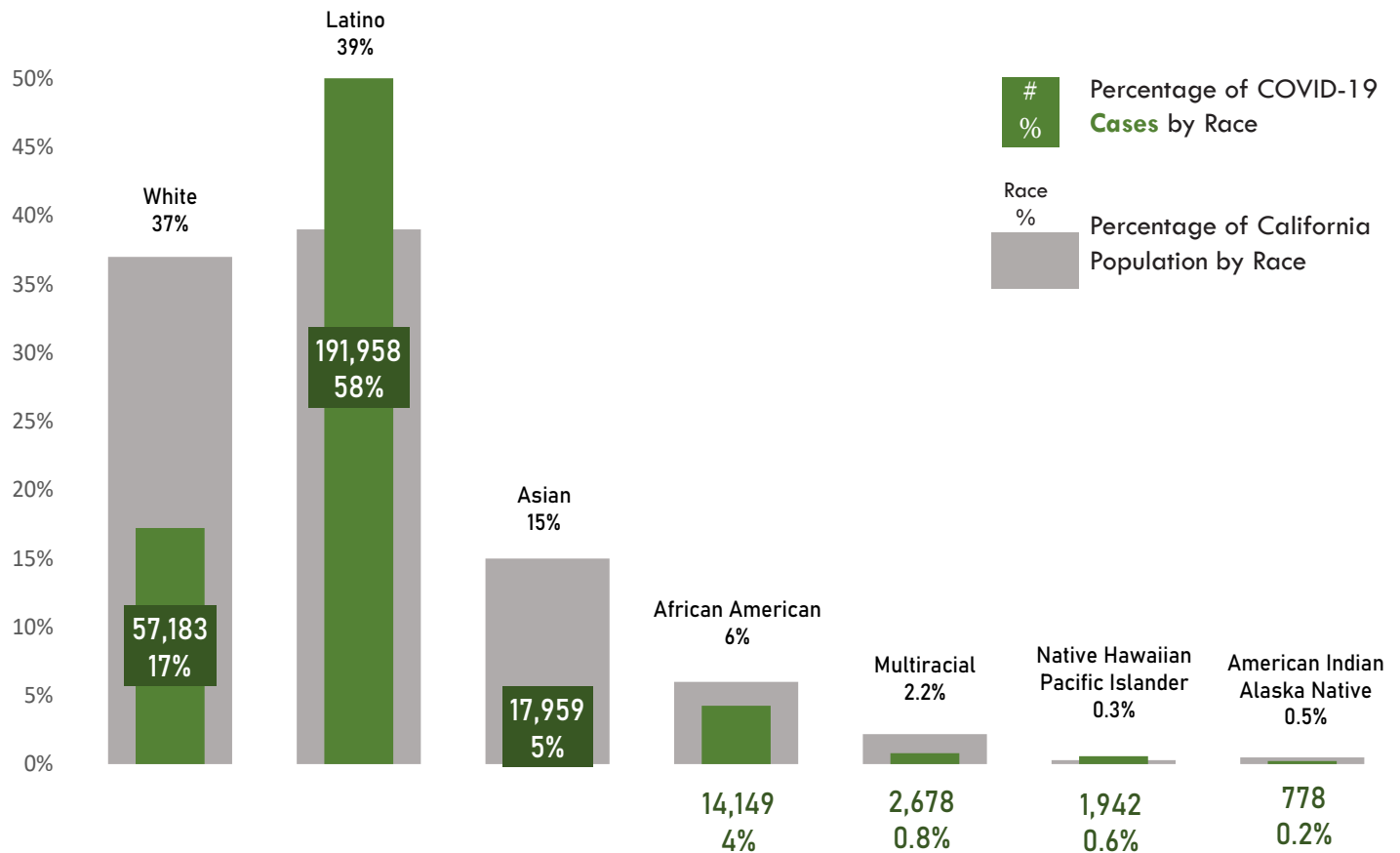


New Confirmed Deaths in California by Date



## RACIAL DISTRIBUTION OF CONFIRMED COVID-19 CASES AND DEATHS IN CALIFORNIA

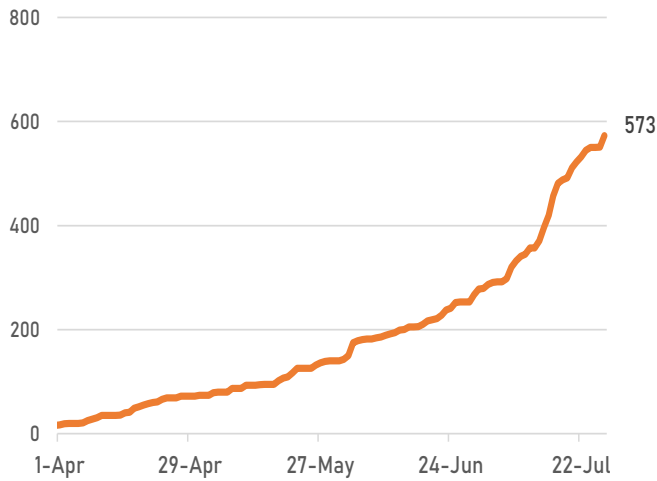
American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, **0.2% of COVID-19 cases**, and **0.4% of deaths** in California. These include **778 cases** and **34 deaths** among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.



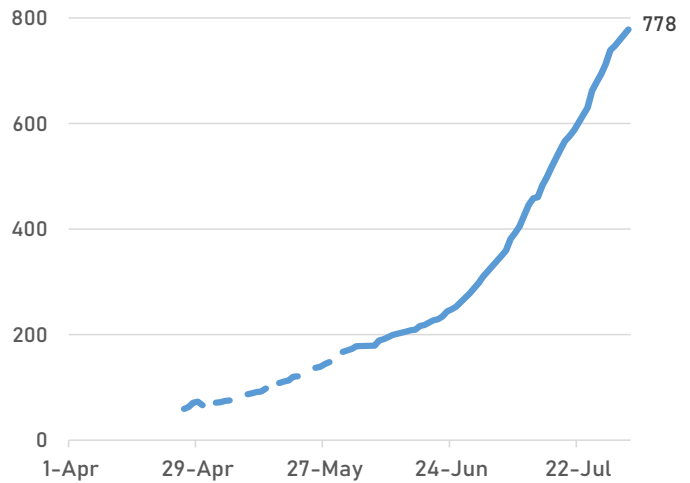

Data from the **Indian Health Service (IHS)** include positive cases reported by Tribal and Urban Indian Health Programs.

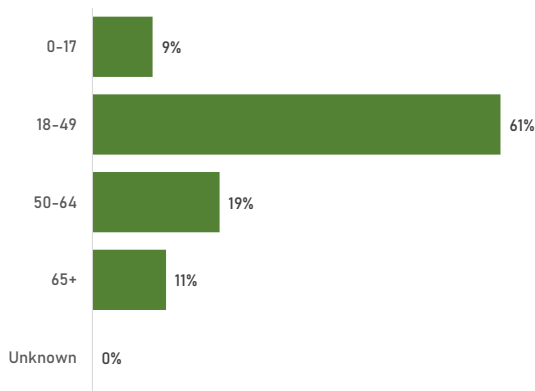


Data from **California Department of Public Health (CDPH)** include all positive cases of AIAN diagnosed in California.

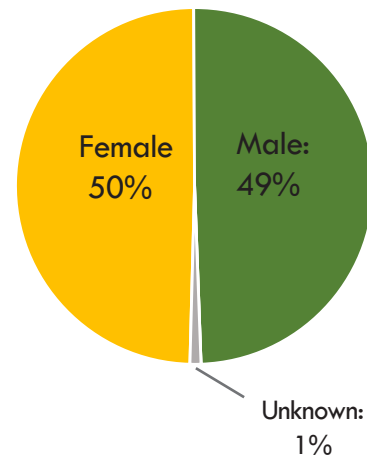

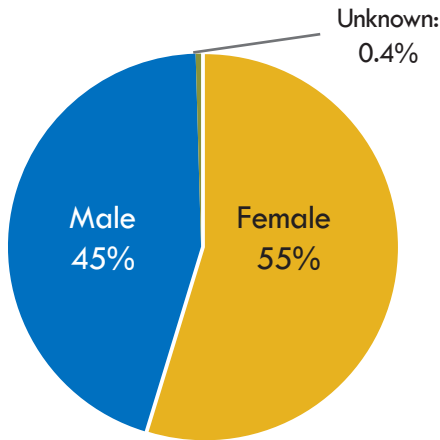
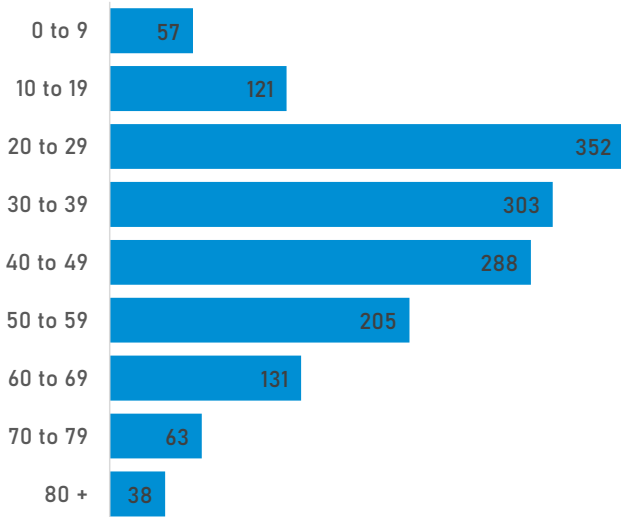
### Racial disparities:

- For all adults ages 18+, Latinos and African Americans are dying at disproportionately high rates. The proportion of COVID-19 deaths in Latinos is more than 1.5 times their population representation across all adult age categories.
- Almost half of all deaths continue to be in the 80+ age category.

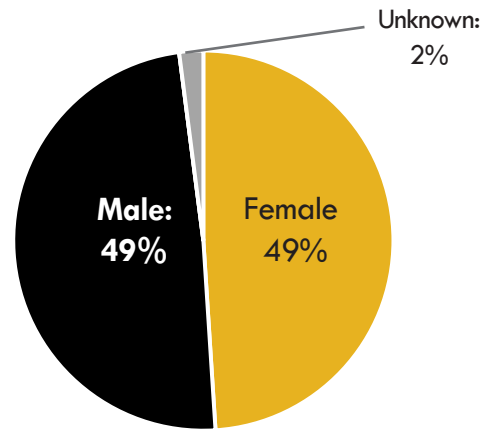
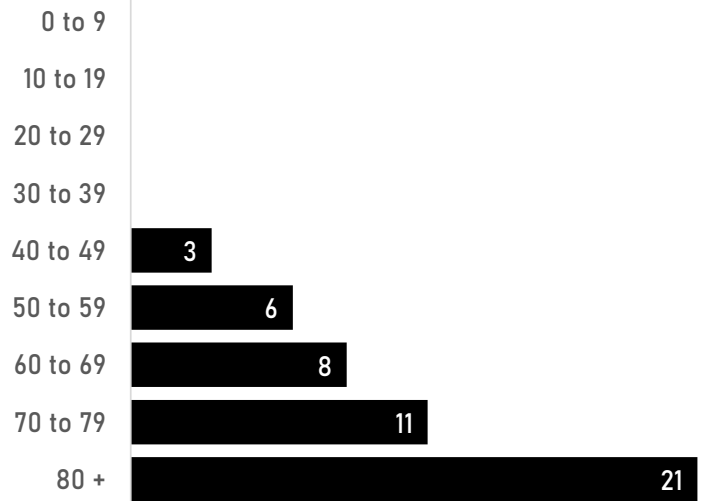

Positive COVID-19 cases among AIAN people in California by Age Group and Gender

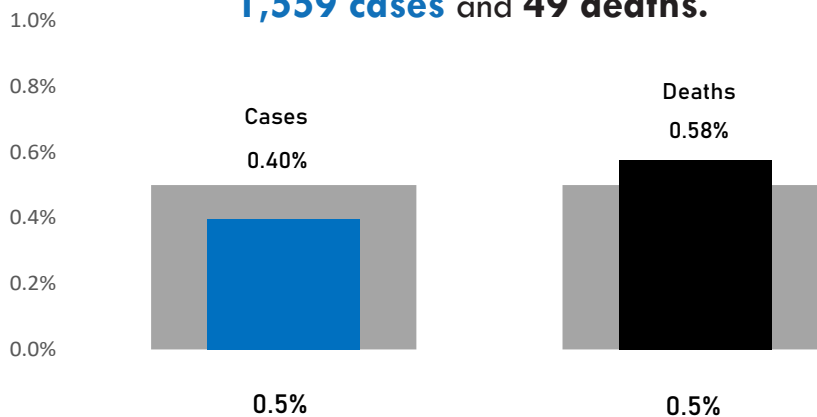


COVID-19 deaths among AIAN people in California by Age Group and Gender



CDC Data show that AIAN in California are testing positive for COVID-19 at rates that are nearly equal to their proportion of California's population, and dying at rates slightly higher than expected. This includes a total of:

**1,559 cases** and **49 deaths.**

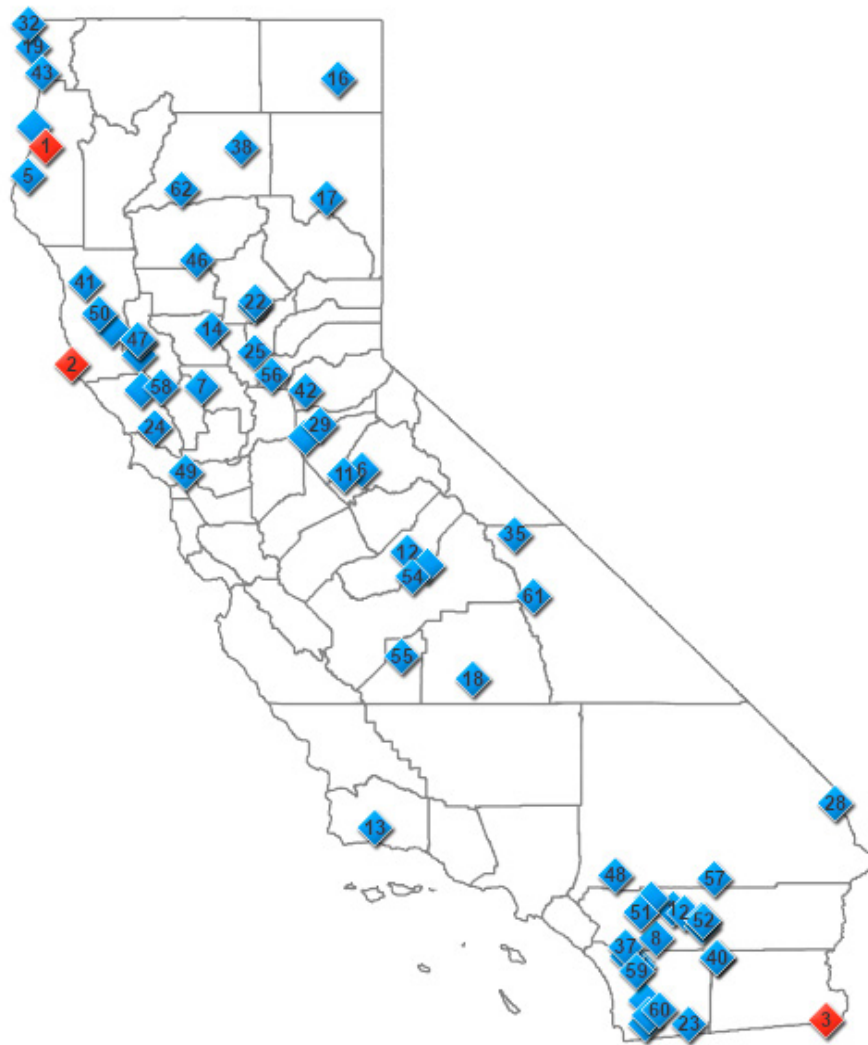

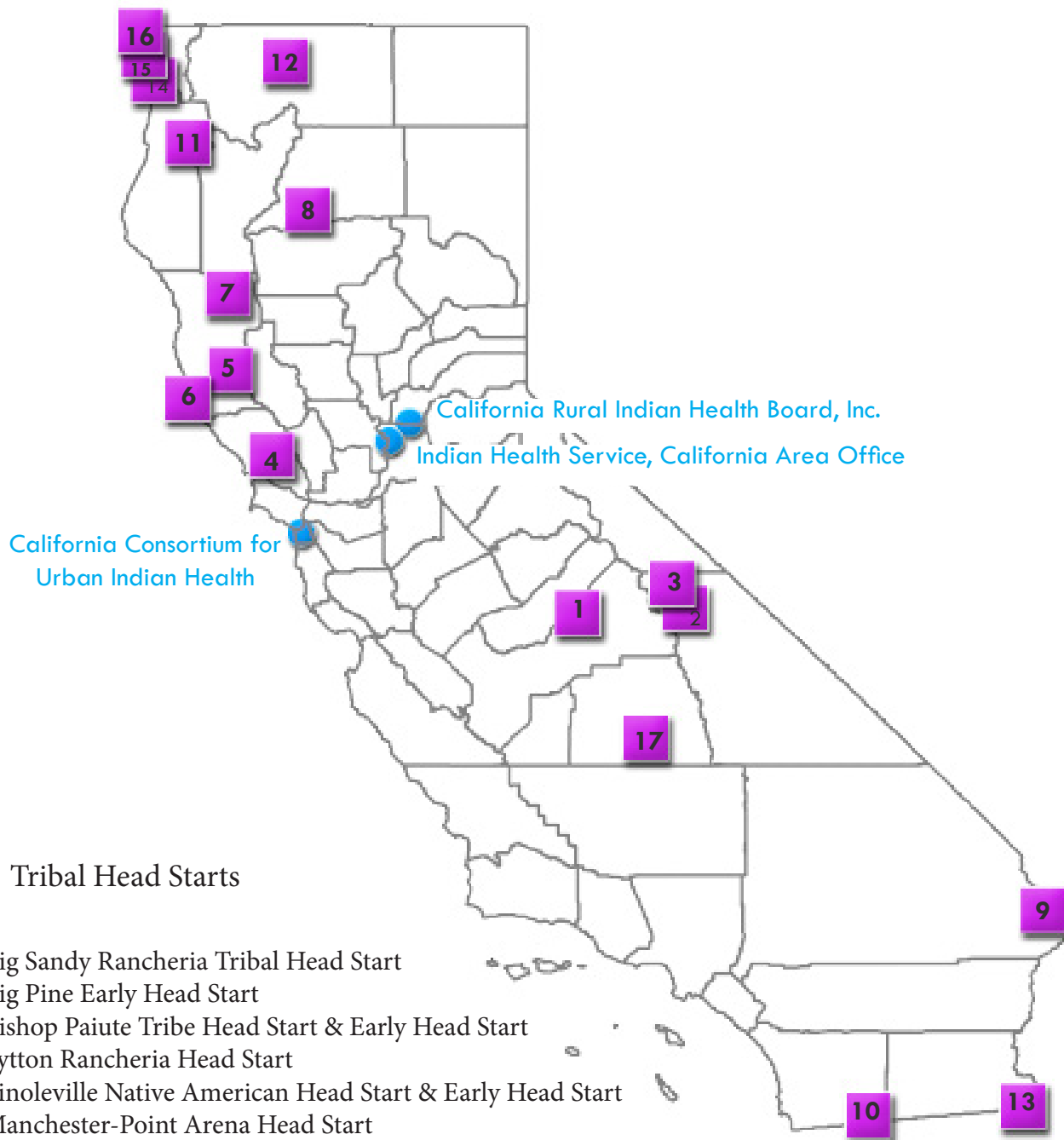

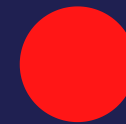
