Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 23.51 million with more than 810,000 deaths.

The total number of cases in the U.S. increased from 5,682,491 as reported on Monday 8/24/2020 to 5,715,567 reported today. The number of deaths in the U.S. increased from 176,223 to 176,617.

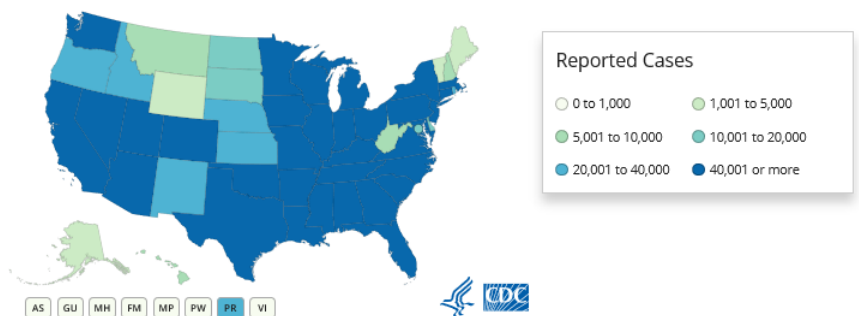
According to MSN, a man in Hong Kong is the first with a confirmed reinfection with the novel coronavirus, a new study suggests. There have been some previous reports of potential reinfection cases around the globe, but none have been confirmed with definitive testing, according to The New York Times. A group of researchers reported today on a case of a patient who was infected with two genetically different strains of the coronavirus, months apart, according to a press release from the University of Hong Kong's Department of Medicine. Antibody tests showed that the patient did not have any detectable antibody to the coronavirus when he was reinfected but developed detectable antibodies after reinfection. COVID-19: U.S. at a Glance*

- Total cases: 5,715,567
- Total deaths: 176,617
- Jurisdictions reporting cases: 55 (50 states, District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands)

*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020. The position statement included a case definition and made COVID-19 a nationally notifiable disease.



A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

A probable case or death is defined by:

- meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or
- meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or
- meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19.

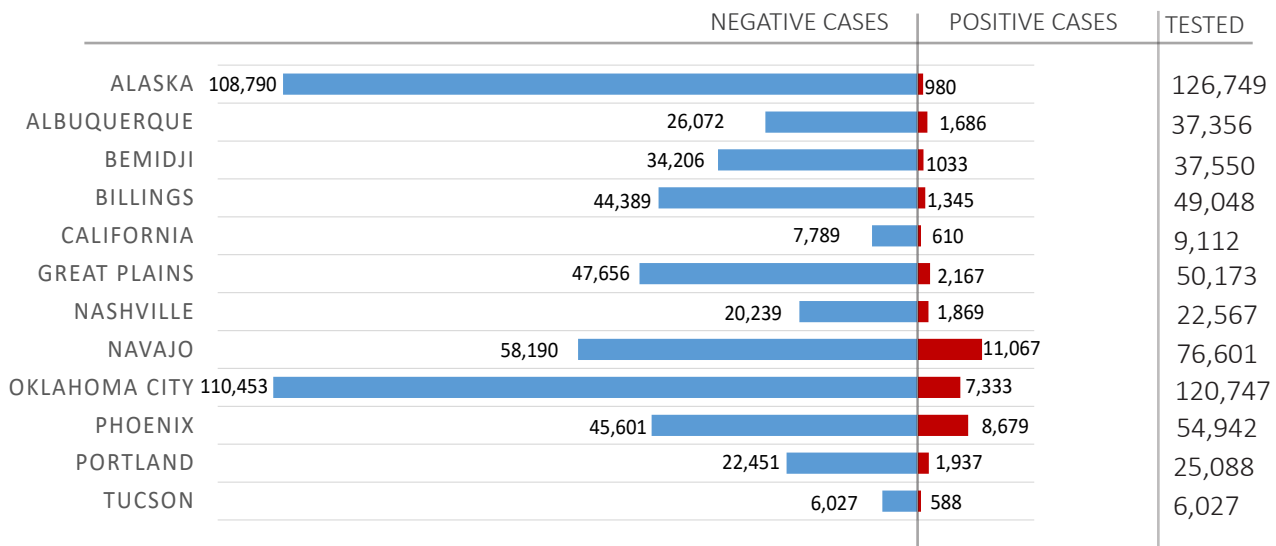
State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.

CALIFORNIA

As of August 24, 2020, there were a total of 673,095 positive cases and 12,257 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

- Age 0-17: 67,462 cases
- Age 18-49: 404,499 cases
- Age 50-64: 127,847 cases
- Age 65 and older: 72,358 cases
- Unknown/Missing: 929 cases

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

- Female: 338,946 cases
- Male: 327,315 cases
- Unknown: 6,834 cases

Lab tests reported statewide: 10,762,506

Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE CALIFORNIA AREA

9,112 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 8/23/2020.

Of these, 610 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 7,789 have tested negative for COVID-19.

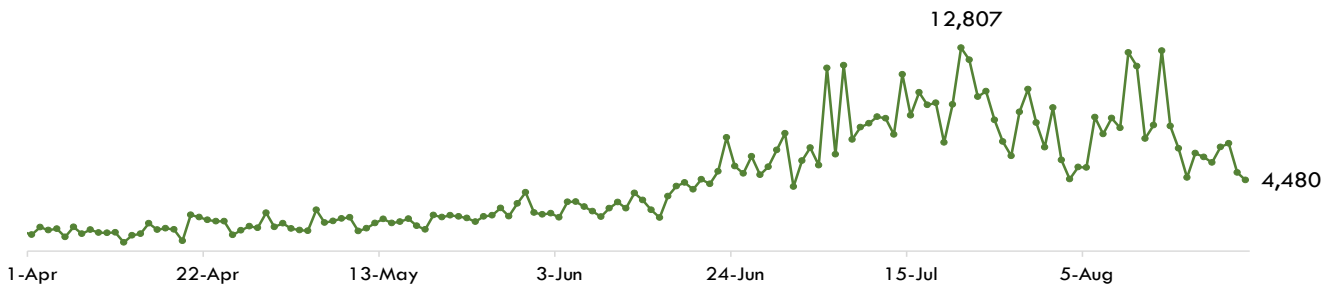

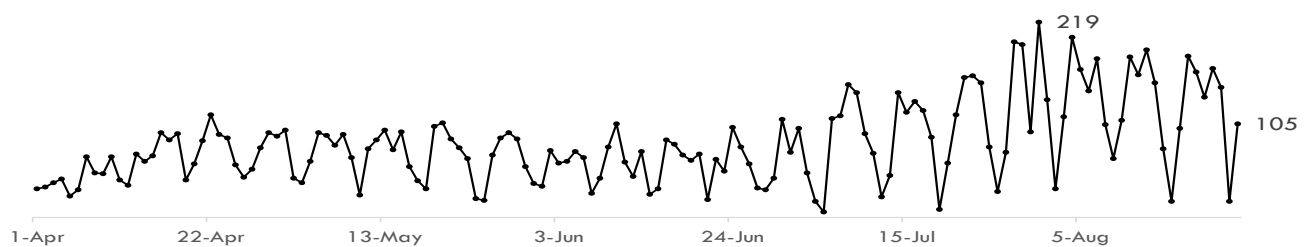

New Confirmed Cases in California by Date



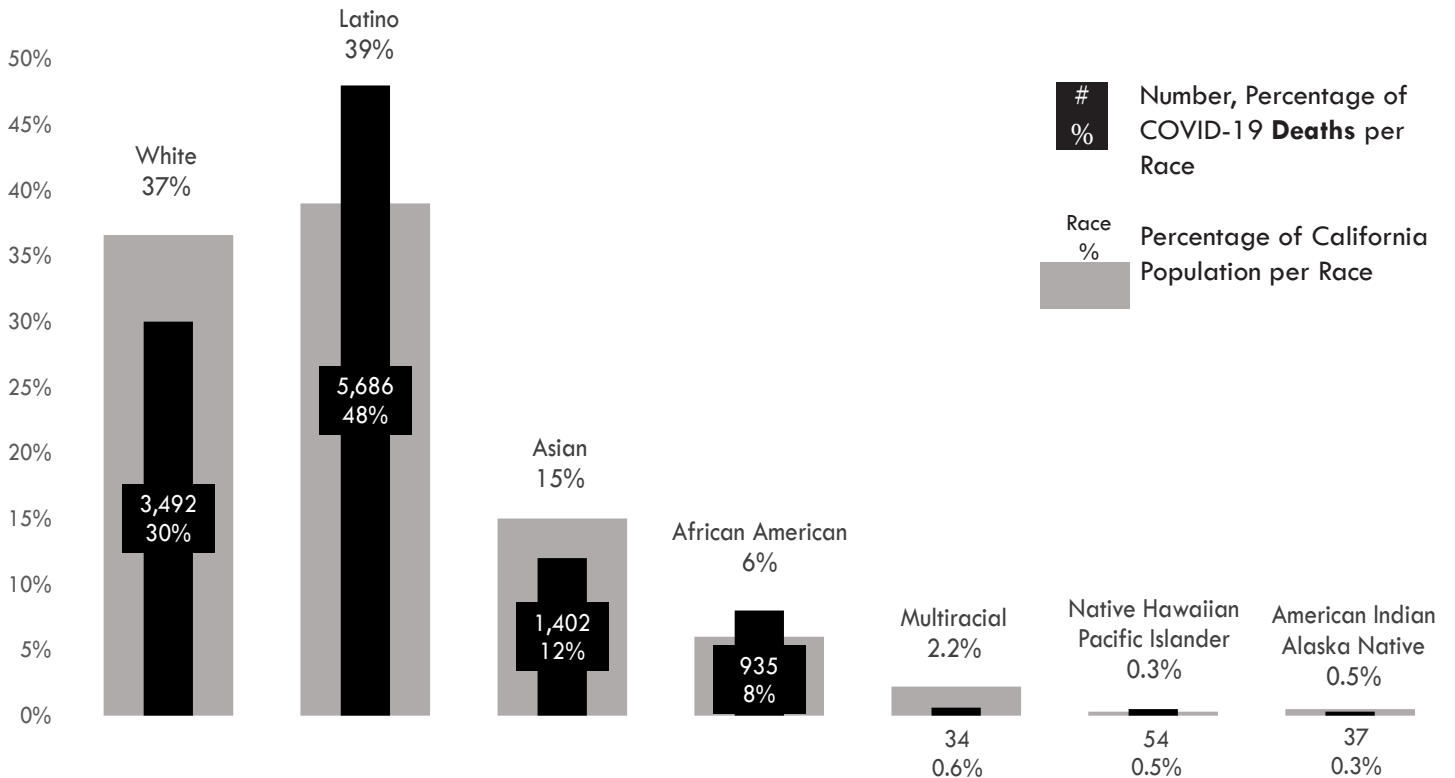
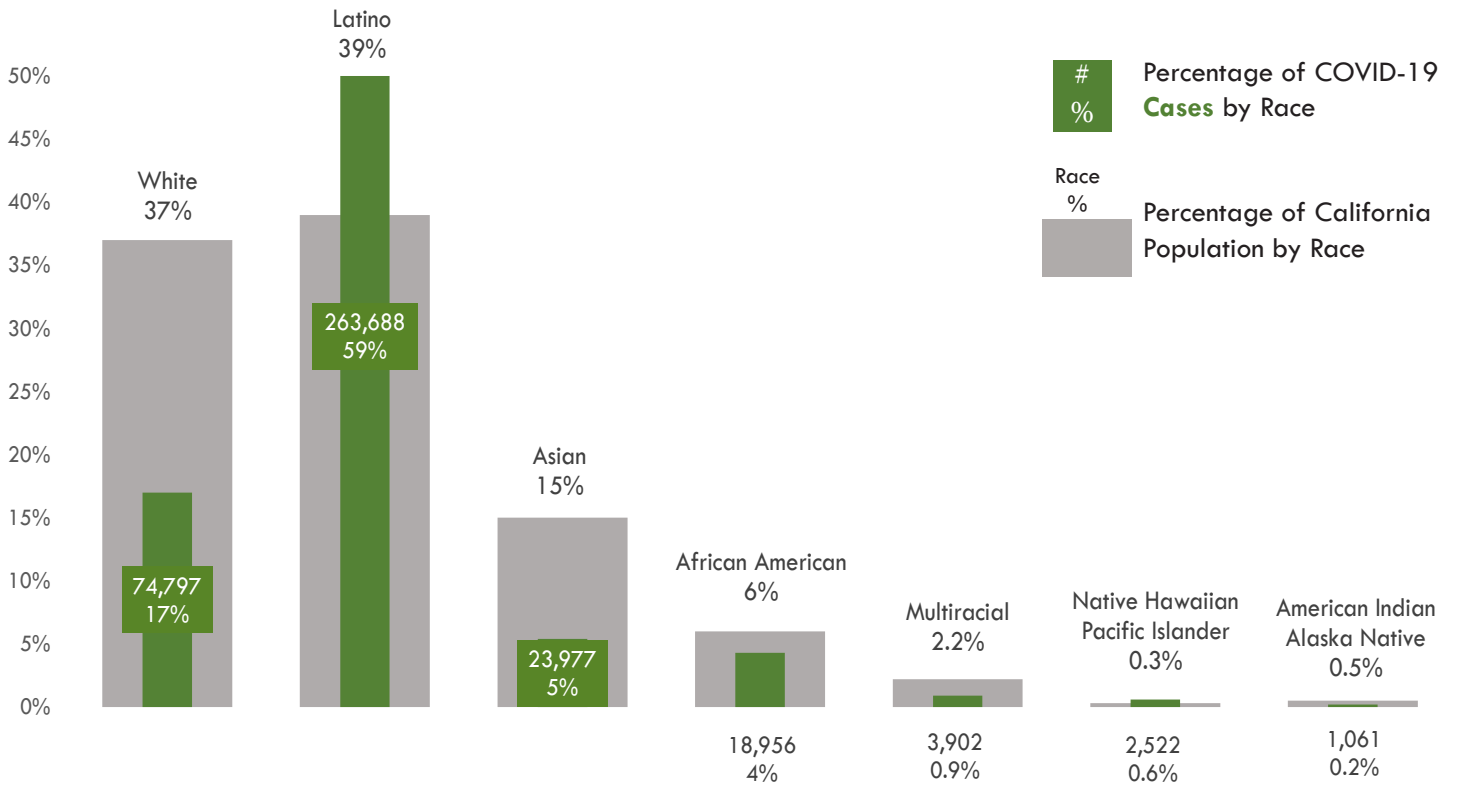
New Confirmed Deaths in California by Date

RACIAL DISTRIBUTION OF CONFIRMED COVID-19 CASES AND DEATHS IN CALIFORNIA

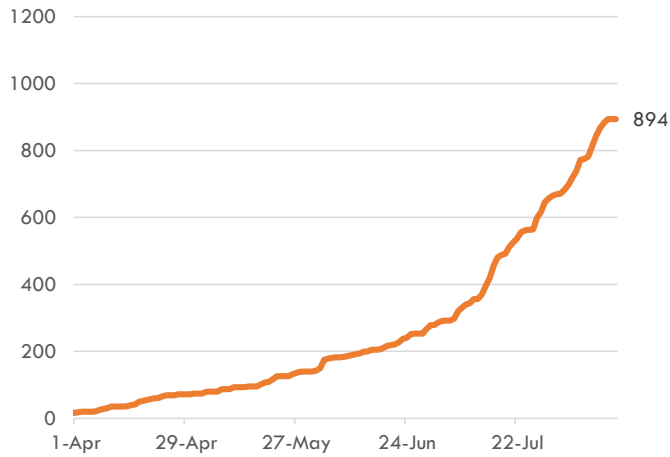
American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, **0.2% of COVID-19 cases**, and **0.3% of deaths** in California. These include **1,061** cases and **37** deaths among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.



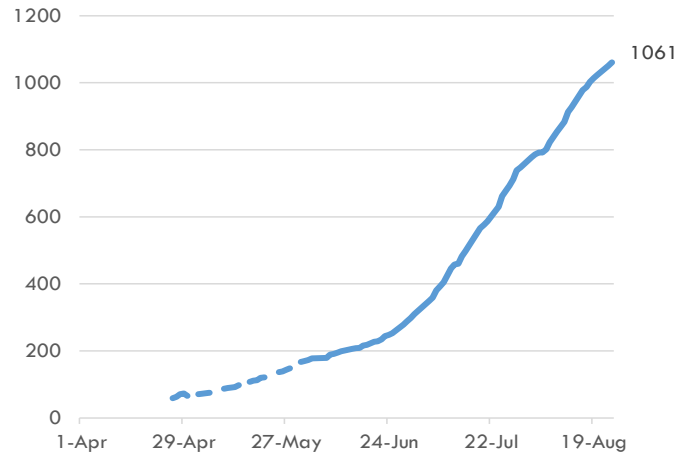

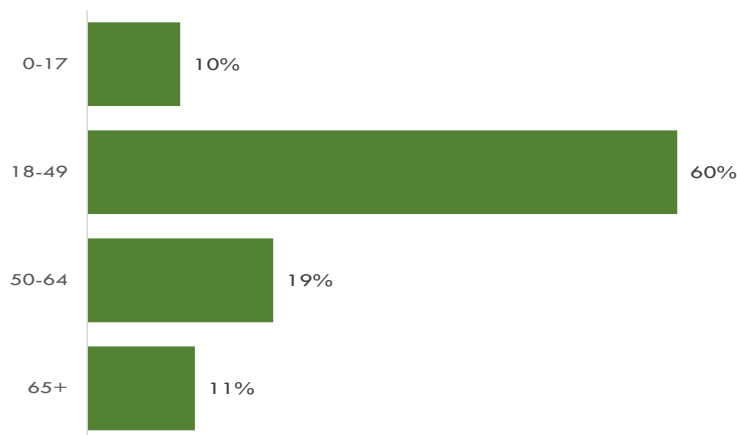

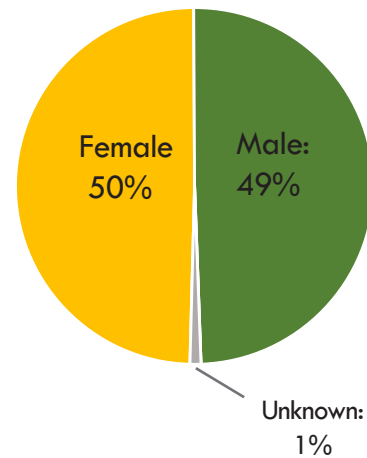

1.8% of cases have died

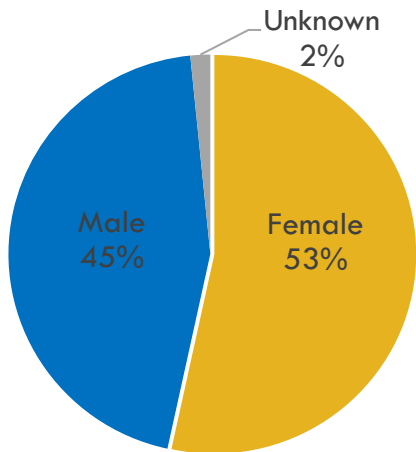
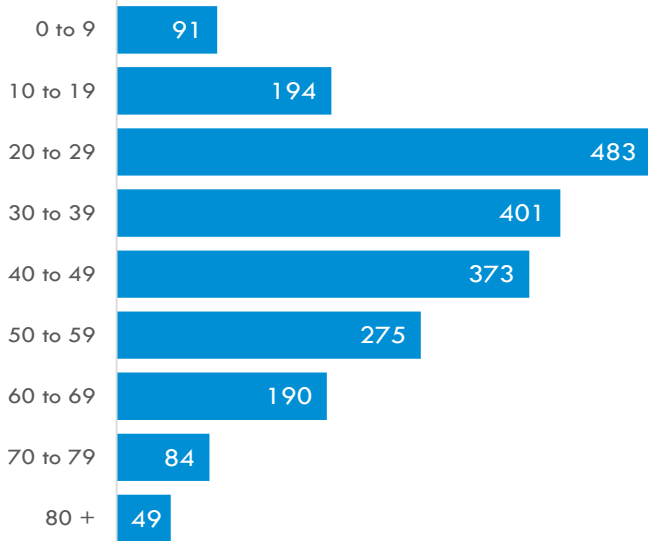
Case and death disparities:

- For all adults ages 18+, Latinos and African Americans are dying at disproportionately high rates. The proportion of COVID-19 deaths in Latinos is more than 1.5 times their population representation across all adult age categories.
- More males (57%) are dying from COVID-19 than females (43%).

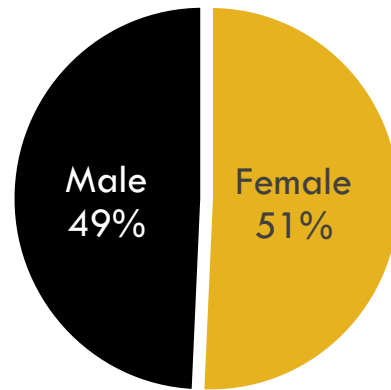
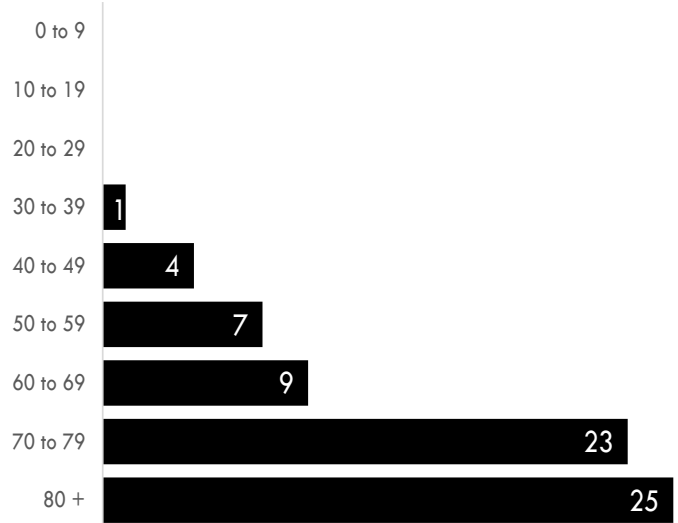

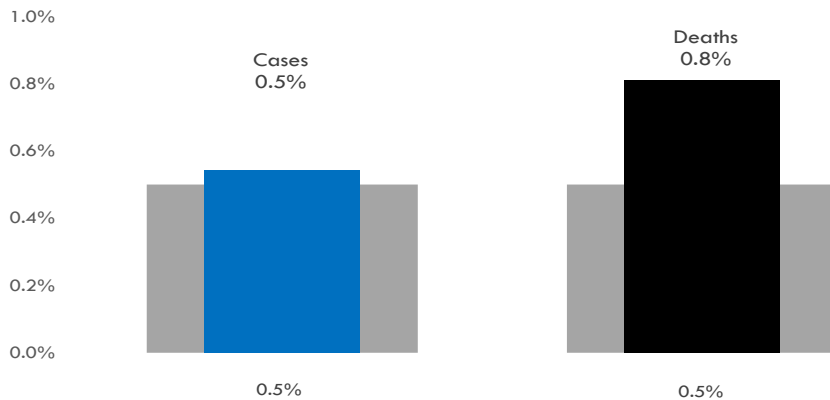
Positive COVID-19 cases among AIAN people in California by Age Group and Gender

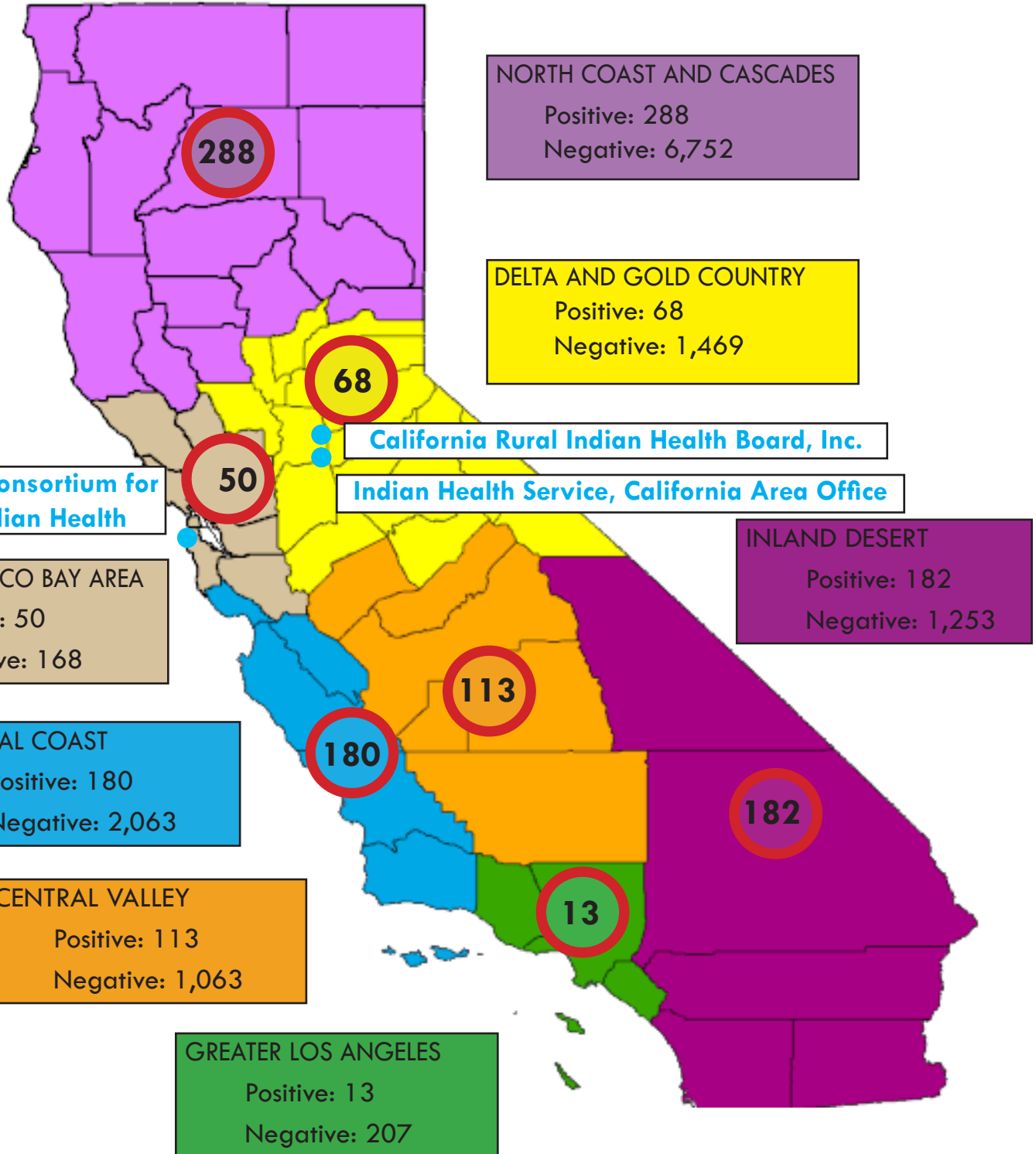

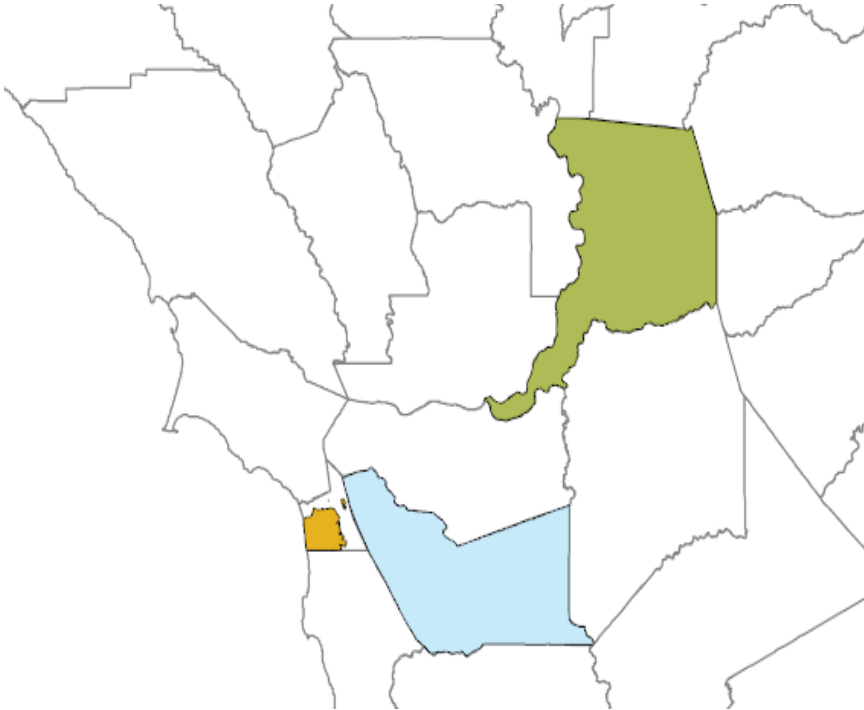

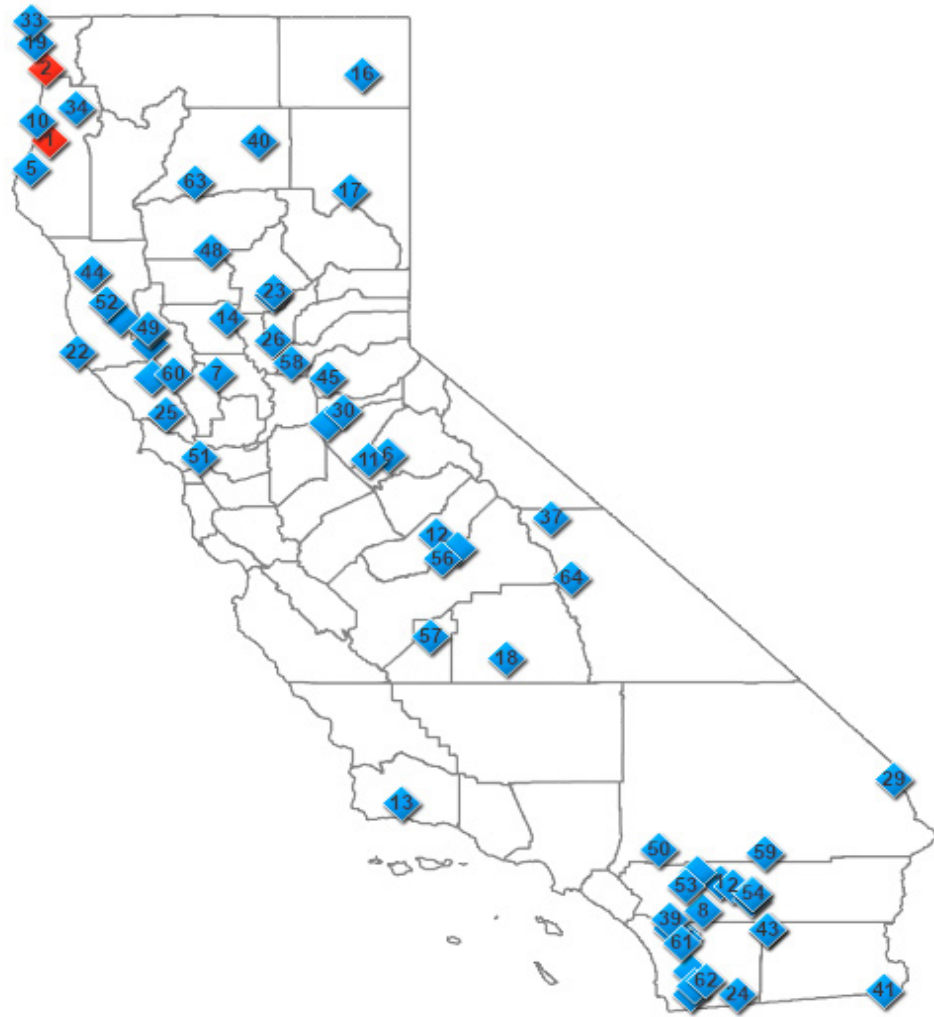

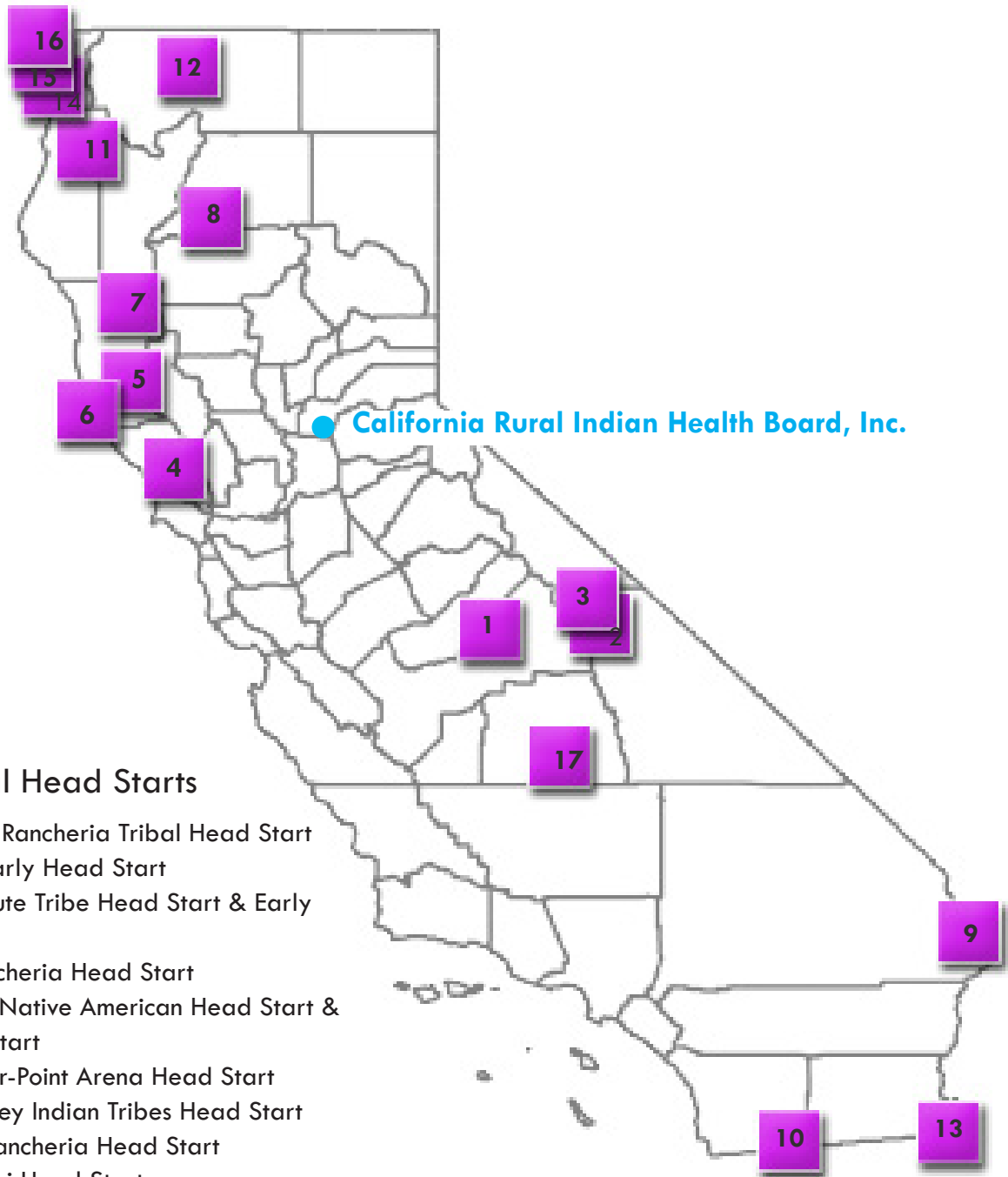
